Georg Streuber (baritone) studied classical singing with Matthias Weichert at the Hochschule für Musik "Carl-Maria von Weber" in Dresden. He participated in the Lied class of Ulrike Siedel and Olaf Bär, as well as in masterclasses with, among others, Gerold Huber, Peter Schreier, Evelyn Herlitzius and Camilla Nylund. After graduating in 2013, Magdalena Hajossyová, Allison Oakes and since 2018 Verena Rein have been important mentors in his vocal development.

In 2011 he won the 1st prize at the International Dušek Competition in Prague, and in 2012 he received a special prize for art song interpretation at the "Lions Singing Competition" in Bad Endorf (Bavaria).

Since 2003, Lied recitals and oratorio performances have been the focus of Mr. Streuber's career. He has worked with conductors such as Christian Kluttig, Peter Schreier, Georg Christoph Biller, Hermann Max, Robin Ticciati, Carlo Montanaro and Simon Halsey. Invitations to recitals have taken him to several German cities, to the Netherlands and to Romania.

Guest engagements have taken him to opera theatres and festivals in Dresden, Chemnitz, Berlin, Bad Hersfeld and Plauen/Zwickau, among others.
